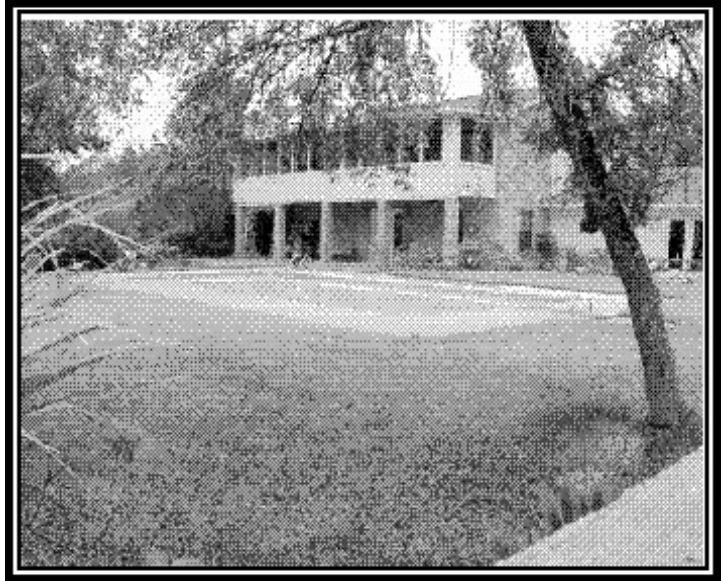

# House Steering Committee Update

**Amazing opportunity! With YOUR SUPPORT**, the Chapter is on the verge of stepping into the premier Greek property at Texas A&M. We have obtained the right to acquire a fabulous property known as 3989 N. Graham Road in College Station on or before May 17, 2002. It is comprised of 7.5 acres south of Kyle Field and just West of Wellborn Road. It has a campus like setting with a main house and garage apartment. The main house is two stories, 4500 square feet, 5 bedrooms and 4 ½ baths with a great room paved with Italian tile that can be used for a terrific meeting room. The main house also has wood floors, wood paneling, and a natural stone fireplace in a large den area. The existing apartment unit was built within the last three years as a separate building over a three-car garage. The apartment is 1188 square feet with two bedrooms, two baths and full kitchen. The property also has a concrete tennis court with spacious, beautiful grounds. The house, apartment building and property are in outstanding condition. The front of the property is cleared and will accommodate plenty of parking spaces. Surrounding properties make up small horse farms. Optimum use includes the immediate construction of a third building with 2400 square feet, which would contain eight suite style living areas accommodating 16 beds. The main house will accommodate 9 beds with another 4 beds located in the existing garage apartment.

We will be able to house 29 men in an ideal setting. We have identified an area in the main house that will be converted to a study area with computers. This study area may be designated a "Residential Learning Center" with which we are working with Sig Ep Headquarters to develop. We are also working with Sig Ep Headquarters to develop a strategy for placing a Resident Scholar at the house. A resident scholar is a graduate student who assists an undergraduate chapter in many areas of chapter operations. This individual lives in the chapter facility, if possible. Resident Scholars provide chapter members with hands-on advice while serving as role models. In return, a resident scholar receives a stipend from the Sigma Phi Epsilon Educational Foundation and may be eligible for free room and board. Their primary focus areas are Scholarship, Leadership, and chapter specific.

We would immediately place the existing property at 4374 Raymond Stotzer Parkway for sale and use any proceeds to reduce debt that will be incurred to assist our move into the new property. The Housing Committee has identified our opportunity at 3989 N. Graham Road after two years of hard work. College Station has stringent zoning laws. A fraternity house may only be located in areas zoned for such use by the Planning and Zoning Commission. We acquired the property at 4374 Raymond Stotzer Parkway in 1983, prior to annexation by the City of College Station. Our use as a fraternity house was "grandfathered" but our property is now zoned commercial/research. We are not permitted to build a large house at 4374 Raymond Stotzer Parkway.



This set of circumstances called for us to look for other property. 3989 N. Graham Road lies just outside the current city limits of the City of College Station, unfettered by zoning regulations. We would be able to occupy the existing premises at 3989 N. Graham Road and build out the new suite style building without restriction.

Our formative vision for the property will be detailed at our Alumni & Awards Banquet to be held in Houston on April 20, 2002, following the Alumni Golf Tournament. We are currently looking for significant contributors to help complete this vision. Please contact David M. Smith, Vice President of Housing at 713-622-6866 if you would like to influence this vision.

What will it take for us to realize our dream? We are continuing our Cornerstone Campaign as our fund raising effort. We began the Cornerstone Campaign effort last Spring before we passed on the former Alpha Gamma Rho house due to mold contamination. We have commitments of approximately \$20,000 in hand. We have set a goal to raise \$150,000 through gifts or pledges from generous alumni, friends, volunteers and parents by July 1, 2002. Total project costs to acquire 3989 N. Graham Road exceed \$900,000. Pledge commitments can extend as long as three years for those wanting to pledge over a period of time. In addition to monetary contributions, we need donations in areas of furniture and fixtures, building materials, outdoor lighting, paving for parking, interior design, kitchen utensils and equipment, dining area furnishings, laundry equipment (washers and dryers), lawn tools and tractors, and many other areas of need. We can also use donated time from those that may be architects, landscape architects, nursery owners, electricians, builders, paving contractors, interior decorators, furniture sales owners, and others. Please see the section in this newsletter on our Cornerstone Campaign for monetary contributions. Please participate in our continued greatness with largess!

## **\$150,000 CORNERSTONE CAMPAIGN OUTLINED**

We initiated a Cornerstone Campaign last Spring to enable us to acquire the former Alpha Gamma Rho fraternity house in the summer of 2001. We had a number of generous contributors step forward for that pursuit. However, after putting together a successful bid to acquire the property, we discovered mold contamination and our plan for housing took another course. The Housing Committee quickly identified another opportunity with even greater potential at 3989 N. Graham Road in College Station. Please see the article in this newsletter titled "Housing Committee Update" for details. We are continuing the Cornerstone Campaign with this new opportunity. Overall project costs for acquisition, partial new construction and remodeling of this property is approximately \$900,000. Our sources of capital for the new house is comprised of (a) equity from our current property realized through refinancing by the National Housing Corporation of Sigma Phi Epsilon Fraternity, (b) a first mortgage loan on the new property financed by a local bank, and (c) Cornerstone Capital campaign contributions. We have identified the need for \$150,000 in capital campaign contributions to make our dream a reality. This is the first major capital campaign in our Chapter's history. Our chapter is becoming recognized as one of the finest in the nation. Please consider your

personal commitment to Sigma Phi Epsilon and how much your experience meant to you. This is a real opportunity to make a difference. An extreme amount of hard work has allowed us to arrive at this opportunity. We cannot afford to let it pass us by. We have already received actual contributions or pledges of approximately \$20,000. We are confident we can achieve our goal with your assistance. We have several levels of giving. You can contribute over a three-year period, which we would encourage if that allows for your greatest contribution. We also accept payment by credit card. You may contact David M.
